

Fair, reasoned process must decide citizenship: Supreme Court

Supreme Court set aside 27 Gauhati High Court judgments on foreigners, mandating fair adjudication for citizenship.

The Supreme Court's directive emphasizing a fair, lawful, and reasoned process for determining citizenship and foreigner status.

Citizenship can be lost through **renunciation, termination, or deprivation**.

Foreigners Tribunals are **quasi-judicial bodies** established under the **Foreigners Act, 1946**.

These **tribunals** determine whether a person is a "**foreigner**" as per the **Foreigners Act, 1946**.
